

My initiation to the Executive Committee has certainly been unique as I was appointed during the Covid19 lockdown and have attended all meetings so far from my office at home, via Zoom or some other technical medium. Feed and financial support has been offered from far and wide and every contribution is greatly appreciated, I cannot thank you all enough. This highlights the fantastic people that make up our industry.

It has now been raining almost constantly for two weeks so meteorologically the drought has broken, the grass is luminescent green as if digitally enhanced, no doubt from the build up of N in the soils and the tonnes that have been applied. The feed shortage is still there but it appears most are getting sorted and the mood has lifted.

Finally, I believe communication during difficult times is key. NEXT GENERATION 2020



EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST IN ATTENDING SOUGHT

The NZDFA has developed a programme to foster the growth of those Next Generation deer farmers in the industry that are keen to learn more about deer farming, connect with other like-minded deer farmers and get on farm to see what is possible with the input of knowledge, technology and a little know-how!

The NZDFA intends to run and host the 2020 Next Generation Conference in Central Hawkes Bay on August 6-7th commencing on site at 10:00am. Numbers will be capped at 60, so expressions of interest are really important!

Day 1 will include visiting two spectacular properties in the centre of the ravages of the current Hawkes Bay drought, but have a legacy of huge commitment to the deer industry and high quality velvet production as a mainstream activity. Both properties have significant deer velvet operations as well as breeding and finishing deer plus significant sheep and cattle operations

- The influential agricultural training station <u>Smedley Station (https://smedley.ac.nz/)</u> and Cadet Training Farm (hosted by Manager Rob Evans)
- TemcoAg which is a large diverse property in the same area, a past winner of the Deer Industry's premier biennial environmental awards programme and also runs a large cropping operation (hosted by George Williams and Laura Billingsand family)

Themes for the day will include an overview and planning for farming in unprecedented drought conditions with shared experiences from other key deer farmers in the Hawkes Bay region related to deer farming under challenging and crisis conditions and reviewing the lessons to be learnt.

Day 2 will feature contact with the support groups that have been behind the drought relief process, especially the Rural Support Trust and their huge role in keeping our farming people under stress in safety and care and coordinating much of the relief programmes put in place. We will extend the emphasis on planning for succession via banking advice and also have some interaction from the DINZ executive team and DFA leadership.

Depending on numbers, the conference dinner on day 1 and the day 2 workshops will either be based in the Waipukuraru/Waipawa region or Napier in the marina area with a chance to meet and get to know again or meet for the first time.

Attendee's get themselves to and from the event and fund their accommodation. The NZDFA provides the meals and activity at no cost.

Logistics - To be confirmed

For travellers from the South Island or distant parts of the North Island, an extra night on the 5th will likely be needed to accommodate the 10:00am start. We will attempt to co-ordinate minivans or group travel from Wellington and Palmerston airports on the 5th, and return on the 7th. Also if demand exists from the Waikato and northern regions (Minivan timings and availability TBC).

So we aren't pushed for time once we wrap up in Napier on the 7th at approx 2:00pm, it is recommended flights depart from Napier airport if departures fly out too early from Wellington or Palmerston North.





DEERPRO UPDATE

The end of the venison production season is upon us again. This time of year is ideal for DeerPRO to give the industry an update on Johne's disease and our contact with farmers along with a quick word on several initiatives to improve our service and make the most of new opportunities.

JOHNE'S DISEASE:

The long term trend of gradual decline of Johne's disease recorded in processed deer continues. This is after some extraordinary recordings in 2018 which have resolved. The causal organism is still widespread but improved herd management and more resilient deer continue to reduce both the signs and impact of disease.



INDUSTRY COVERAGE

The programme's coverage continues to grow. For deer killed this season to date, it provides regular reporting to 555 farmers representing 78% of the total kill and 92% of the JD-suspect lesions recorded at processing.



Review DeerPRO reporting to farmers

A review of the information in our standard report was held with veterinary and ag consulting expertise in March. It was prompted by the recent major review of the animal health part of Deer Industry New Zealand lead by Scott Meacham who also chaired our event. Key points arising from our day were the importance of keeping the report as brief but informative as possible, the potential of a much simpler 'dashboard' type layout for a few key metrics, and from Wayne Allen the value of including what rate of a farmers deer kill out under 45kg. Wayne's suggestion has been included in our report and the 'dashboard' approach is being explored further.

REPORTING HEALTH AND DEFECT INFORMATION BESIDES JOHNE'S TO FARMERS

Reporting processor recorded health and defect information other than Johne's back to farmers is an opportunity for the programme. Historical data and expert opinion have identified liver damage is the most likely candidate. A pilot investigation was held at the Duncan South plant last October. A 3 month trial had been planned at this plant and Venison Packers in autumn when the damage is most common, but was suspended due to COVID19.

NAIT FOR AGE OF DEER

Recently we have established a connection with NAIT where they provide us age details for processed deer. DeerPRO sends a list of NAIT codes from processed deer several times a year and they send back their age data for that code. Age is automatically assigned when the tag is registered, or it is assigned by the farmer. It is recorded for around 35-40% of processed deer at present and should increase substantially in future.

This approach to aging enables more accurate growth rate and other productivity calculations.

OPERATING UNDER LOCK DOWN

The Project Manager has a permanent office set up at his home. Priorities for the lock down period were

- · phoning farmers to suggest joining the programme
- completing a protocol for obtaining data from NAIT
- Comparing the two approaches for aging deer, either by NAIT or by ASD was also a substantial part of lock down work.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

For the first time in a decade the programme was over budget in the earlier part of this year. This was due mainly to DeerPRO reports being sent to all our farmers summarising chilled season performance. A request from DINZ to revise budgets downward and the impact of COVID19 will see us conclude the financial year around 10% under budget.

OSPRI UPDATE - DECLARING NON-NAIT ANIMALS AT YOUR LOCATION

Declaring your non-NAIT animals in NAIT by July 31 each year, supports disease management and national biosecurity. OSPRI have put together 2 fact sheets to help with this.

Why do I need to declare non-NAIT animals?

Many farmers already declare their non-NAIT animals voluntarily. This new requirement gives us a better idea of where animals of different species are being farmed together, which is essential for managing disease outbreaks that cross between species, such as foot and mouth disease (FMD).

What type of animals do I need to report?

All cloven-hoofed species that currently require movement recording using Animal Status Declarations (ASD forms) are to be declared, due to their risk of contracting FMD. This includes, sheep, pigs, goats, alpacas, emus, llamas, and ostriches.

How often do I need to update the stock tallies?

Farmer feedback was taken on board. The reporting date aligns to the period that farmers report stock numbers at the end of the financial year. The tally must be updated annually by 31 July and reflect the estimated numbers as at June 30.

What if I don't declare non-NAIT animals at my location?

If you are a registered PICA (person in charge of animals) and don't declare non-NAIT animals, you will be at risk of a \$400 infringement notice.

Background

The NZ Fallow Deer Society after discussion with members has made the decision to move into recess and deposits its remaining reserves with the Spiers Memorial Trust. The Society was the first group to consider this move when it deposited \$35,000 of reserves under the leadership then of Chairman Ken Swainson. The monies are retained in the Trust under an MOU with the NZDFA and Trust, on a rolling 5 year term. The Trust has also enjoyed similar generosity with Branch reserve as the West Coast and Wairoa DFA Branches have also moved into recess or amalgamated with other branches.

The Trust has these invested in A++ secure investments with Craigs Investment Partners and ANZ and the MOU secures the original capital for the future should the Society's next generation wish to reform. Interest and capital gain returns are used by the Spiers Trust to foster leadership developments for individuals (Kellogg Rural leadership Programme, Nuffield Scholarships and Ag Innovation conference delegates at Otago University).

The Trust has also co funded with DFA some sponsorship for the DFA Branch based Parasite workshops being run by DINZ. The Fallow Society and DFA Branches in recess who have followed this route has allowed the Trust much great opportunity to support its co funding of applications. DINZ though the leadership budget and DFA itself also co-fund to 50 % of any successful application.

FARMING THROUGH 2020

Farmers, lifestylers and hobby farmers will all be recovering from the impacts of the 2020 drought and COVID-19 restrictions this year. There will be feed shortages and financial challenges for parts of rural New Zealand. To get through, keep planning ahead, and use the help available.

REMINDER FROM THE NVSB

Now that we have more freedom to move under the Covid-19 restrictions this is a reminder to all velvetters to get their end of seasons returns back to their veterinarians for reconciliation, signing off and the storing of all unused velvetting drugs. The NVSB certainly appreciates, that many velvetters have already completed these requirements.

The NVSB advise that due to unforeseen circumstance compounded by Covid-19 that the proposal to introduce new electronic velvet ID tags for use this coming velvet season has been delayed until the 2021/2022 velvet season. They advise that the same "Blue" wristband type ID tags will be used again for the forthcoming season. All requirements around the use of these tags remain the same as the previous season.

Have you had an RCS audit of your velvetting facilities?

If the answer is yes, and you have a "passed" result then well done. If the answer is yes but you have "awaiting actions" then you need to have this work completed by the agreed time frame signed off with your auditor. Once this work has been completed you need to verify this with your auditor who will then, if satisfied, sign you off as "passed"


If you have not yet had an RCS audit and you haven't had notification from either the NVSB or an auditor, and you still wish to be able to sell velvet from your facilities then please contact Pam MacLeman pam.macleman@deernz.org (mailto:pam.macleman@deernz.org) or John Tacon john.tacon@deernz.org (mailto:john.tacon@deernz.org)

NB Very important. If your facilities have not been signed off by the beginning of this coming velvet season, then legally you cannot sell velvet into the export food chain. Your facilities must show a "passed" status. If the facilities are not "passed" then it is also illegal to sign a VSD. The only exception will be those facilities that the NVSB has officially listed as still waiting for an audit.

Velvet buyers are very aware of all requirements under the RCS and will refuse to buy or uplift velvet from non-approved facilities this coming season. MPI compliance officers will be checking velvet consignments at RMP premises during the season to ensure all requirements are being met.

NOTICEBOARD

THE JULY 2020 OUTLOOK



Winter really is here - we start July with strong, cold, southerly winds across the country, driven by low pressure near the Chatham Islands and high pressure in the Tasman Sea. We'll see sharp frosts for inland areas of the South Island, and showers falling as snow over hills and mountains of both islands, although north of Taupo, showers will be few and far between.

This weekend, expect temperatures to recover as northwesterly rain moves in. This won't last long though; early next week, we revert to chilly southwesterlies with a few showers and passing fronts.

Into week three, high pressure shifts from the Tasman Sea cross North Island producing a drier than average outlook there although temperatures will be near normal. This produces westerlies across the South Island, with fronts struggling to cross the divide with any real purpose. At the end of July, we may see better northward progression of fronts thanks to a weakened Northland ridge.

Bottom Line: July starts with a burst of cold, wintry southerlies with showers for those exposed to the south. After that high pressure builds in the Tasman Sea before migrating northeast across the upper North Island. Wettest conditions (compared to normal) will be for the lower and western South Island, the driest (compared to normal) will be the upper and eastern North Island.
